Beveridge and the Five Giant Evils The origins of the welfare state

### Context

In 1942, the Beveridge Report was published. Beveridge was a labour politician and member of the coalition government of the time. He was commissioned to look at whether a more joined up system of 'social insurance schemes' could be created. His report stated that society needed to battle the Five Giant Evils (see below), with a 'cradle to grave' social programme. He recommended that people in work should pay a contribution into a state fund that could be used to provide people with the means to support daily living, in the form of sickness, medical, maternity, old age, unemployment, widows, orphans, industrial injury and funeral benefits. He also advocated for a free national health service.

## **CHOOSE 1 OF THE FOLLOWING TASKS**



1: The Beveridge Report

- You must create a visually appealing summary of the Beveridge Report. For example, you could use imagery relating to the phrase 'from cradle to grave'.
- Ensure that any key terms are defined. For example: social insurance scheme; and the different types of benefits Beveridge proposed.



- You must create a poster on the fourth of the Five Giant Evils, what Beveridge called 'squalor'.
- Can you give examples of 'squalor' in 1942? Ensure it is clear what this term means.



6: Idleness

- You must create a poster on the first of the Five Giant Evils, what Beveridge called 'idleness'.
- Can you give examples of 'idleness' in 1942?
- Ensure it is clear what this term means.

- A huge number of important events and changes have occurred in that period.
- Your challenge is to create a timeline to illustrate the changes the NHS has been through.
