New computers donated by Sellafield Ltd.

Millom School welcomed 32 computer towers which were kindly donated to us by Sellafield Ltd back in the summer.

A representative from Sellafield made comment to The Mail with regards to the donation;

“An opportunity was identified for Sellafield Ltd to make a lasting contribution to the education of our local communities”.

“Computers started to become available as a result of the company’s migration to the Windows 10 platform which include a large roll-out of new machines to all our employees”

“Sellafield have over the past 18 months been able to provide a substantial number of devices to local schools spanning from Silloth to Millom. From laptops during the pandemic to classroom desktops providing advance IT capacity”.

The equipment donated has been deployed into two classrooms to improve the whole school’s IT robustness.



Polite Reminder about Nut Products

We have a small number of students in school who have a nut allergy.

We would like you to remind your child of the importance of not bringing nuts or products containing nuts into school, even if products state 'may contain nuts' just as an extra precaution, please do not bring them onto school site.

A reaction to a nut allergy for some of our students can be very serious and cause anaphylaxis, even if the product is not directly consumed or touched by them. Some nut allergies can also be airborne.

Millom School will not use nut oils in any lessons, nuts and nut products are not used within any catering options and nuts have been prohibited within the Refectories and all eating spaces.

If a student presents as unwell staff have been educated on the signs and procedure to take in order to respond to the student and request urgent assistance.

Students who have a nut allergy have a detailed Health Care Plan which is updated on a parents request and then circulated to staff for their information.

Staff at Millom School have a red card attached to their lanyard which is worn at all times, the information they need to follow in an anaphylactic reaction situation is written on the red card.

Now the festive season is upon us and students may be exchanging food products as gifts, we cannot stress the importance on this enough and we thank you for your cooperation in helping to make our school a safe environment for all students.

What is Anaphylaxis?

Anaphylaxis is a severe and potentially life-threatening reaction to a trigger, such as an allergy.

Symptoms of anaphylaxis include feeling faint, finding it hard to breathe, a fast heartbeat and feeling anxious.

Anaphylaxis needs to be treated in hospital as soon as possible. Use an adrenaline injector if the person has one and call 999 for an ambulance.


Anaphylaxis is usually caused by an allergic reaction. Common triggers include foods, medicines and insect stings.

You can help prevent anaphylaxis by avoiding any triggers you have and carrying your adrenaline injector at all times.

What is most common cause of anaphylaxis in UK?

Common anaphylaxis triggers include: foods – including nuts, milk, fish, shellfish, eggs and some fruits. medicines – including some antibiotics and non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) like aspirin. insect stings – particularly wasp and bee stings.



Good work 7C, this is such a lovely idea!




Photography Workshop
