It has been a wonderful end to the term as we were able to bring back presentations evening, for the first time since 2019. This was an opportunity to celebrate the achievements of our students from across the year groups, including Year 11 and 13 leavers collecting their examination certificates, and many of our students collecting governor and special awards. The evening included musical performances by students, and ex-student and former professional rugby league player Bradd Crellin as special guest awarding the prizes. We were also able to hold the Christmas Concert back in Holy Trinity Church with excellent performances by our students and an opportunity for the community to join together and mark Christmas.

An Enrichment Visit to Holy Trinity Church

The Local History Group have visited the accident monument of Holy Trinity Church this afternoon to learn about the origins of Millom and how the town developed through the Norman conquest, the medieval period and up to the end of the English Civil War and Millom Castle's decline.

Thank you to Margaret and Geoff Edmondson for a fascinating tour.

Did you know that the road Millom School is situated on is called Salthouse because there used to be salt pans located here? In medieval times, and perhaps before, seawater would gather from the estuary and the water evaporated to harvest salt, a valuable commodity for preserving food. The income from the salt industry went to the owners of the castle, the Huddleston family.



Mock Interviews

Year 11 Mock interviews took place in November. Even though the students were nervous, they conducted themselves to a very high standard. The interviewers were very impressed. Many thanks to all involved and a big well done to our year 11 cohort.

Feedback from the interviews showed the following:

92% of students stated they felt more/ much more confident following their interview.

88% of students stated they felt more/ much more prepared.

85% of students will alter their CV.

ECO Textiles

The Eco Textiles group have been busy designing and making 'bags for life' from sustainable cotton fabrics.

The aim is to cut down on the use of plastic bags by using sustainable, recycled fabrics to create quality bags that will last.

The theme the group worked on was 'sea life' due to the fact that so much of the plastic used in the world ends up in the oceans and harms the 'sea life'.

Students used a range of dying and printing techniques in order to decorate their bags.

The bags will be donated to the community as part of the 'Morsbag' initiative.

The group have also been looking at 'fast fashion' issues that harm the environment with using recycled fabrics to recreate catwalk inspired fashion pieces.



Girls Football

Inspired by the recent success of the Lionesses, we have also experienced some success with our own teams.

First to kick off were the U13 girls who faced Dowdales in the County FA Cup. This was the first time most of the girls had played in a "proper" match but they showed great effort and enthusiasm. Despite losing heavily, the score did not reflect the fact that it was a fairly evenly matched game, but we lacked on goal-scoring skills.

The U14 girls were first in action at the Football Festival at Dowdales School. A very determined effort with some excellent football on display (helped along by a bit of Martha's magic!) saw us reach the semi-final. This ended in a 2-2 draw and went to golden goal. Unfortunately, we lost out to a bit of a goalmouth scramble but the girls should still be very proud of their success. Lots of goals scored!!

Next up were the U13 team in their Football Festival, again at Dowdales. Some strong opposition proved to be a bit too much for us, but we still enjoyed playing and managed to score a few goals. The girls again, showed great determination and there were definitely signs of potential for future matches.

The last festival was the turn of the U12 girls. Our first match against Walney clearly showed the strength in our team with an emphatic win. Our second match against UVHS was a very close match showing great determination and skill from both teams, with us finishing second! Our final match against Furness Academy saw another strong win. Throughout the tournament we scored a lot of goals, defended strongly and saw some super saves, finishing runners-up in our section to Ulverston. We now look forward to a rematch in the FA Cup! This is a team to watch!!

The U12's then travelled to Ulverston for the much awaited rematch, this time in the U12 County Cup. This was a hard fought match with the final score being 5-1 in favour of UVHS. However, we hit the woodwork twice and had a goal dis- allowed. 5-4 would have been a far fairer result and a better reflection of an even sided match.

The long awaited U15's first fixture was against the Lakes School in Windermere. We had our fair share of "Martha Magic" as she scored a hat-trick, but other team members were keen to get on the score sheet too, with excellent goals from Phoebe, Kaitlin and Hannah as well. Both sides had strong teams and there was some lovely football played, but we were the much-deserved winners due to some excellent defending. 6-1 was the final score and Kaitlin was voted Most Valuable Player by The Lakes team.

We now wait to play the next round of the U15 Cup against Queen Katherine School from Kendal and the U14s await West Lakes Academy in the next round of their cup.

Goat Aid

As part of the Geography GCSE unit on 'People of the Planet', the students are required to study an example of an aid project which influences Low Income and Developing Counties.

In recent years we have chosen to study an aid programme called 'Goat Aid'. The students use this as part of their larger case study on Ethiopia. In this study, they learn about the impact of donating a goat to young people in poverty and the long term influence it can have on their quality of lives.

For the fourth year running, the Year 11 Geography students have chosen to fundraise and purchase a goat. This will go a long way to help young girls who might otherwise be left extremely vulnerable as a result of poverty.

School Reminders

If your child is absent from school, please remember to ring in your child's absence or email the school Reception before 9:30am. A reason for absence needs to be given. If a reason has not been given and you haven't informed school of your child's absence, you will then receive a text message/email from the school. Upon receiving the text message/ email you can reply to the text, email or call the school directly with the reason for absence.

In order for us to authorise medical appointments please provide the school with a copy of the appointment card or letter, a picture or copy of this can be sent to school via email or given to your child to hand in to Reception where we will then take a copy of the document. We would however like to stress that where possible, appointments are made out of school time so that your child's attendance isn't affected.

Holidays should not be taken in term time. All requests for time out of school should be addressed to Mr MD Savidge either via email, using the school email address or by letter.

Students should be wearing the correct uniform for school. Reminders with regards to uniform, hair and jewellery can be found on the school website and in the parent handbook.

If your child has forgotten their lunch or money they will be able to get something from either refectory and the money spent can be paid back the following day.

We will not be able to deliver bags, PE Kit or any other forgotten items to your child. We will accept these items into Reception but it is the child's responsibly to collect these things from Reception themselves.
